Grading

Your final grade for this course will be determined by averaging grades from seven activities/assignments:

3 <u>rehearsed</u> improvisational period scenes 3 period resource papers Final Exam activity

PLEASE NOTE: In order to pass this course, you must turn in all three resource papers.

As you will see from the enclosed calendar, you will get two chances at each rehearsed improv. Although the grade you receive for the improv in each time period is assigned only to the repeat, the instructor will take note of the effort, thought, and rehearsal apparent in the first presentation. I am very aware that you may not get all the elements right the first time, but if you slough off because you know that only the repeat is being graded, that lack of effort will drag down your final grade in this section.

If you do not complete all the requirements for the course as listed on this syllabus, you will receive a final grade computed as though you had received an "F" on any missing projects or segments. If you wish an "Incomplete" grade for the course --which will allow you additional time to complete the missing segments--you must contact the instructor by the date of the final exam, requesting such a grade. If instructor agrees, you must then fill out an "Incomplete Contract" form. Student retains a copy of this Incomplete form, which specifies what must be done and when for the removal of the Incomplete. Students receiving an "Incomplete" grade for any course should read the catalog carefully regarding the procedures for removing the "I" from their record. Please be aware that an "I" if not removed becomes an "F" in one year.

REHEARSAL COSTUMES

Rehearsal costume pieces, especially designed for Drama 551, will be checked out to each of you periodically throughout the semester. In cut and shape, these costumes are historically accurate reproductions of actual period garments and accessories. They have been chosen because they provide important physical feedback in support of the manners and movement for the respective periods. You are each responsible for the safe-keeping and return of any costume items checked out to you.

The check-out procedure for each group of costumes will be announced in class. Please Note: Because these costumes are subject to heavy wear-and-tear, and because replacement of the costume elements is an expensive proposition, you will be asked to pay a \$15.00 usage fee for these costumes. This fee is payable at your initial fitting, and should be in the form of a check made out to the SDSU Costume Shop. Please do not use these costume elements for anything other than the 551 assignments without the express permission of the Costume Shop.

The Design Research Center, DA6, located down the hall from DA5, is the place where these rehearsal costumes are checked out and returned. Maren Lyman, Costume Graduate Assistant, is the person in charge of all 551 rehearsal costumes. Please see her in the Costume Studio if you have any questions about, or problems with, your rehearsal costumes. (Maren will also be available in the Design Research Center from 12:00 to 12:30 on the class day following your initial taping of the scenes to provide additional feedback for your re-working of the scenes.)

I recommend that you get a <u>full-length</u> locker for the semester in which to store your 551 rehearsal costumes. Most items should fit in this locker. Those items that are too big to do so may be stored in the Design Research Center AFTER YOU HAVE CHECKED THEM OUT. Be sure you mark any stored items with your name on a piece of masking tape. Make locker and storage arrangements with Teri Tavares, in the Costume Studio.

EACH OF YOU is responsible fro helping to create and sustain the period social event that will be the focus of this Final Exam. The success of this Final depends on your ACTIVE effort in RESEARCHING, PREPARING, and DEMONSTRATING mastery of the MIND-SET, COSTUME, MOVEMENT AND MANNERS OF THE CHOSEN PERIOD.

At the Final, the **food** will be **real-**made by you from an actual period recipe that you will research.

The entertainment/activities will be real- actual period games, dances, entertainment, that you also will research.

However, the costumes, environment, props, etc, will be whatever we imagine them to be.

There are THREE MAIN THINGS you must do to prepare for this Final:

1. INVENT A CHARACTER you will portray throughout the Final, with a specific history (age, family, residence, occupation or avocation, etc.) DO NOT come as royalty.

DETERMINE A SPECIFIC GOAL your character must accomplish at this social event. This must be an **active**, **doing goal**, <u>not</u> a passive state of being. (Example: "To goad X and make her so angry she breaks her fan".) Be prepared to sustain this character and pursue this goal, improvisationally, throughout the entire two-hour Final, no matter what occurs.

ACTIVATE THE APPROPRIATE ATTITUDE, MIND-SET, AND MANNERS FOR THE PERIOD. Be prepared to incorporate suitable etiquette, movement, and management of costume into your character's behavior at the event. Also be prepared to TALK with the other guests at the event about subjects appropriate to the period. This may require additional research on your part. Feel free to draw situations from plays, books, movies, etc. if they would be helpful to you.

2. RESEARCH and MAKE A RECIPE OF THE PERIOD that will feed up to 4 people (not an army!). (Consult Resource Bibliography for sources.) Recipe must be for 'finger food' (i.e., food that does not need a fork, spoon, or knife to eat) OR for a period beverage appropriate to the occasion. Bring the food or beverage to the Final, ready to be served at the appropriate time during the event. Attach a label to the food identifying what it is and the source from which you got it.

Your recipe must be approved in advance by the Refreshments Coordinator.

3. RESEARCH, PREPARE, AND PRESENT at the Final a suitable example of ENTERTAINMENT OF THE PERIOD. (see Resource Bibliography). Your entertainment must be approved by the Entertainment Coordinator in advance.

<u>A Reminder</u>: This Final is a 2-hour GOAL-ORIENTED improvisational experience involving period social interaction, conversation, dancing, feasting and merrymaking. The CHALLENGE for each of you will be to SUSTAIN YOUR CHARACTER while PURSUING YOU GOAL AS ACTIVELY AS YOU CAN, all the while handling with absolute confidence the Victorian/Edwardian costumes, manners, movement, and mind-set appropriate to the occasion, no matter what happens.

PREPARATION PRIOR TO THE FINAL:

- 1. Follow the <u>General Instructions</u> (distributed previously) in choosing, getting approval of, and preparing your character, goal, recipe and entertainment. **Observe the deadlines listed in these instructions.**
- 2. Review the OFFICIAL GUEST LIST which will be distributed in class, Thursday, May, 17, so you can come prepared to talk appropriate 'Victorian' topics with the guest characters for the duration of the Final.
- 3. Prepare your approved Victorian food or beverage recipe. Attach to it a label that identifies what it is. <u>Before the Final begins</u>, bring your food or beverage to 5B where the servants will arrange it on appropriate tables.
- 4. <u>Before the Final begins</u>, bring to 5B your own **teacup** (beverage container) to drink out of. LABEL it clearly with your REAL NAME so the servants can identify it easily.
- 5. If desired, you may supplement your rehearsal costumes with added trims and accessories. Please do not try to check out any actual items from the costume shop. You will be turned away. Invent your own 'fabulous fakes.'

Ladies and Gentlemen: you must prepare a calling card for your character. (They are the size of business cards.)
